Dear Parents,

Over the last few weeks the teachers have been busy getting to know their new classes - we have had academic meetings for key stage teachers, our academic lead teachers have met each week and Caroline Miller and myself have discussed the learning profile of each child with their teachers. This September, for the first time, children have completed GL assessments from Year 1 upwards to create a baseline to measure children's standing in Maths, English and Science. These will be repeated next May to measure progress over the year. We will be looking closely at these assessment results when they arrive to discuss strategies to ensure that each child receives the right amount of challenge and support in the classroom and beyond so that their learning is extended.

In the next couple of weeks, you will have the opportunity to meet with your child's class teacher. We value this meeting, early in the academic year, as it helps develop a strong partnership between home and the class teacher, I hope you will be able to make the appointment.


PERFORMING ARTS

Gymnastics club – Over the last couple of weeks our lunchtime gymnasts have explored lots of equipment and built on their climbing and rolling skills. Last week we used the equipment. Swimming

Working to be an all-round swimmer.

At Springmead we use the water skills awards as our assessment tool. However, we also try to ensure that all our pupils are confident able swimmers by the time they complete year 6. The minimum standard expected in the curriculum is to complete 25m unaided, and we have always surpassed this.

We include several skills such as floating, sculling, jumping in and even diving. Plus, work on all 4 strokes and learn the basics of tumble turns in our higher groups. This enables children to feel confident and safe in the water and in many cases provides the steppingstone needed to go into competitive club swimming. This is something we are very proud of and love to hear about the successes of our swimmers outside of school. We have had children go on to compete at local, county, regional and even national level in the past.

Class Highlights


DUCKLINGS

The nursery children loved watching them, petting, feeding and learning all about rabbits with rabbit books, stories and facts. Betty and Ernie will come into school on different days each week, so they get to see and know all the children in the Nursery class.

Last week we were enjoying the sunshine, so storytelling moved outside as we created our own Stickmen to act out the story. This week's story is all about Going on a Bear Hunt. We've set up a small world area in the classroom. It has inspired lots of story language and interactions. We visited the castle across the road too, on Wednesday, as conker inspectors to check on the progress of the horse chestnut tree. We are pleased to report conkers are growing, some are white still in their cases, and there are some on the ground but plenty on the tree. They are quite small but we have high hopes of larger brown conkers being produced and dropped to the ground over the next few weeks. We will visit the tree each week to report on its progress. We sheltered under the tree in a downpour and talked with the children about how the tree's canopy stopped the rain.

They made some great pictures of London burning by blending pastels as the blazing background and cut out silhouettes of buildings.

They also looked at a map of London that pre-dated 1666 and they worked out where the fire spread to on which days.





BADGERS

Who knew that there were so many different nouns! Each Badger was given a selection of nouns which needed to be sorted into the different classifications. They made a fine job of working together, discussing reasons why which word should be placed in which group and getting those cogs whirring. All this teamwork was not dissimilar to the workings of the Roman Army, about which the Badgers found out more this week. Having learnt about eagles, with the class poem, it was a handy link that the Romans used an eagle as their symbol. It was an important part of the design, together with a thunderbolt (see poem) which symbolises Jupiter, the king of the Roman gods and not to mention the red colour for Mars, the god of war. The Badgers have been busy investigating and preparing their own shield designs.


