## Class Highlights

#### **DUCKLINGS**

As the Autumn begins the children in the nursery explore the season with rich hands-on experiences. Through nursery walks, our grounds, nature study, trips to the field and around the village they begin to see patterns in the seasons. We draw their attention to the change in temperature since the summer, the months of the year, the need for warmer clothing, their own experiences of going to bed in the dark as evenings draw in, the work of local farmers with crops and animals, the changes in nature and finding out about native animals that are beginning to hibernate. We introduce the language of time too: yesterday, tomorrow, last year, next year, first, next. By helping little children recount their own experience of events in the past and to come in the future they explore the abstract concept of time. These concrete markers of familiar special times bring an awareness of the passing of time - past, present and future. Over the next two weeks our focus will begin to be on harvest, farms and food culminating in joining in with the rest of the school at **Harvest Festival** where the children will sing the song they have been learning, performing in **front of family and friends**.

We cut out eyes, eyebrows, lips, teeth and hair to create our own individual faces. We had to demonstrate super concentration skills. #### **OTTERS**

The children loved making apple crumbles, honing their culinary skills, peeling, chopping and rubbing butter together for the crumble mix. The school smelt wonderful as we made our crumbles on the same day as the Hedgehogs, clearly gearing up for the return of The Great British Bake Off!

In SPaG the focus has been on the structure of sentences. Remembering where to use capital letters, full stops, question marks and exclamation marks, can be quite tricky.

This week in history, the class focused on the rebuilding of London after The Great Fire. They looked at the Declaration King Charles II made in 1666, where he pledged to rebuild London and the children became budding architects, designing a street in London. They also sketched some detailed pictures of Sir Christopher Wren's design, St Paul's Cathedral, which look excellent!





#### **BADGERS**

What a week for the Badgers! One minute everyone was leaping into action, following instructions and carefully positioning bodies in a comfortable recovery position and the next it was time to re-create the times and vibes from when the Romans invaded about 2,000 years ago. Both activities involved working together and finding solutions to problems. Getting into character as the infamous Boudicca and daughters, everyone worked in groups imagined what it would be like and how would they feel having a Roman Centurian delivering the news that all land and goods would be removed immediately. How rude! The intrepid actors gave sterling performances as they demonstrated angst, hurt and anger about their situation.





## **SQUIRRELS**

In maths this week, we have been looking at Roman Numerals; a numerical system composed of seven Latin letters. They are, from lowest to highest: I, V, X, L, C, D and M.

The Squirrels learned some very important rules when using Roman numerals. They are usually written in order, from largest to smallest and from left to right, but more than three identical symbols never appear in a row. Instead, a system of subtraction is used: when a smaller number appears in front of a larger one, that needs to be subtracted, so IV is 4 (5 - 1) and IX is 9 (10 - 1).

They worked hard on applying this rule to larger numbers.

#### **OWLS**

We began this week in Owls with a discussion in PSHE about the different emotions we may experience every day and how we can manage emotions that are uncomfortable or overwhelming. We highlighted the importance of sharing our feelings with others and being confident to label the emotion we are experiencing and reflect on what has caused it. We then discussed the strategies that may be used to improve our mental wellbeing, such as exercise, spending time with family or friends and ensuring that we are gentle and kind to ourselves.

In English this week we have been looking at newspaper reports, with a specific focus on using direct and indirect speech. The children did a great job at remembering all the different speech punctuation and even learned a new song to help them remember! We have also got stuck into our new unit on Addition and Subtraction in Maths, looking at mental strategies and column method.


