
Our thanks to judge, Pamela Price for judging the competition with knowledge and

- (3) BOOK IN PERSON AT THE BOX OFFICE pay just the ticket price and no extra fees.


Performers have seats allocated to them, there is no need to book separate tickets.

CHRISTMAS GIFT SHOP



The children at Springmead have relished the experience of going to the Christmas Gift Shop and buying presents for members of their family over many years. Going shopping, planning gifts for others, rather than for yourself, is a very momentous event and ties in wonderfully with the Christmas message of giving. Our gift shop is a valuable event that relies entirely on the generous donations from parents and staff.

This year the Gift Shop will work as follows:

- The shop will be open on **Thursday 14**th **December** for children to select presents for their family. Nursery children can buy presents when they are in Nursery that week with our pop-up shop.
- The children and their teachers will gift wrap and label the items.
- All presents cost £2.50, children are allowed to spend a maximum of £12.50, on up to 5 presents.
- Children will be asked to bring in their shopping money in an envelope marked with their name and the names of the family members for whom they are buying gifts, the week before the shop opens. This will help us to ensure we have enough gifts of the right sort!
- Gifts can come into school in carrier bags from now onwards, there is a box in the library, or send them in with your child.
- Money raised from the Gift Shop will be used to buy additional equipment for the children, through the **Springmead School Association**.

The shop relies completely on donations from parents, gifts should be something your family members would like to receive, such as toiletries, stationery or toys.

Swimming Update

Technique over speed.

While children are learning to swim, it is really important for them to focus on getting technique right rather than how fast they can swim. As if they are able to learn the skills and techniques correctly it establishes good habits, and the speed naturally comes. Whereas if you focus solely on going fast without the correct technique, it is significantly more difficult to correct the strokes once they have become a habit.

We do have some opportunities for those that are already secure in their technique to compete for the school. We also do the house gala at the end of the year for the children to all have a go at going fast, seeing how they have progressed and show off all their skills and technique.



DUCKLINGS


Our nursery environment is always child centred, supportive, and engaging but one that children can access independently for themselves. Nursery life is different to home - with many children to look after, practitioners focus on supporting children to become independent - putting on their own shoes and socks, finding the hook to hang up your own coat, recognising your name on your drawer so you can put your own bag away, all are important skills in becoming independent - growing self-esteem, organisational skills and resilience. To help children manage these tasks, practitioners break them down into smaller steps to make them less daunting. Children at first, manage the last steps, so the illusion is created that the whole task has been completed independently - next time a further step for the child is added and so on so eventually the whole task is completed by the child. Practitioners know to create a sense of fun and sparkle into mundane jobs and are quick to add magic through a game or distraction to encourage children to stay on task. We use the well-known 'Magic Coat Trick' in Nursery which makes putting on your coat an easier job. Sometimes we all need a bit of magic!



HEDGEHOGS

Can you believe it, Hedgehogs you have completed your first half term at school and what a brilliant half term we have had! We have been particularly focusing on our letter formation this week and trying hard to write simple words, using the sounds we have learnt so far. We are becoming more independent by the day, and we have made wonderful progress with our phonics already. Well done, Hedgehogs.

We have also been doing lots of activities to help strengthen our hands and fingers which we know will help us with our handwriting. We each have our own mini sparkly playdough pot which we use to pinch, squish, squeeze, splat and press and we do it to music. It's lots of fun. This week we made our own autumn inspired salt dough which was a sensory sensation as we added nutmeg and cinnamon to the dough. We used our fine motor skills to mix it and squish it into a ball, patted it down and used leaf cutters to create some shapes which we will dry out to decorate our autumn tree. Lots of learning and growing in Rabbits again this week. We have just started a new block of learning in maths starting with learning parts of whole numbers.

OTTERS



SQUIRRELS

October is Black History Month in the UK. The aim of BHM UK is to focus on promoting and celebrating the contributions of those with Caribbean or African heritage to British society.


As a class, we looked at the arrival of The Empire Windrush Britain, which brought 500 migrants from the Caribbean to Tilbury Docks in Essex in 1948. Britain was just starting to recover from World War Two back then, and many of these people answered an advert to come to Britain where there were lots of different jobs to do. However, when the passengers landed, they didn't always get the friendly welcome they had hoped for. Many of them experienced racism and discrimination and often found it hard to get proper homes to live in or to make friends with British people. It wasn't always easy for the new arrivals to get jobs. Some companies said they didn't want black people to work for them. Following on from this, we explored the 1963 Bristol bus boycott protest over the refusal of the Bristol Omnibus Company to employ non-white people. Following the peaceful boycott, the company overturned their decision. The event marked a significant moment in the UK civil rights movement. The Squirrels thought carefully about how life would have been for these migrants and shared their very empathetic thoughts and feelings on this matter. It was a lovely discussion session which brought up some very interesting questions, comments and discussions, which was lovely to be a part of.
