



#### **CHRISTMAS GIFT SHOP**

The children at Springmead have relished the experience of going to the Christmas Gift Shop and buying presents for members of their family over many years. Going shopping, planning gifts for others, rather than for yourself, is a very momentous event and ties in wonderfully with the Christmas message of giving. Our gift shop is a valuable event that relies entirely on the generous donations from parents and staff. Thank you so much to families who have donated already.

This year the Gift Shop will work as follows:

- The shop will be open on **Thursday 14**<sup>th</sup> **December** for children to select presents for their family. Nursery children can buy presents when they are in Nursery that week with our pop-up shop.
- The children and their teachers will gift wrap and label the items.
- All presents cost £2.50, children are allowed to spend a maximum of £12.50, on up to 5 presents.
- Children will be asked to bring in their shopping money in an envelope marked with their name and the names of the family members for whom they are buying gifts the week before -by **Thursday 7**th **December** This will help us to ensure we have enough gifts of the right sort!
- Gifts can come into school in carrier bags from now onwards, there is a box in the library, or send them in with your child.
- Money raised from the Gift Shop will be used to buy additional equipment for the children, through the **Springmead School Association**.

The shop relies completely on donations from parents, gifts should be something your family members would like to receive, such as toiletries, stationery or toys.





#### **Social Media**

We are aware that children in our older years are using social media and in particular Instagram. We understand that some children's accounts are monitored by parents, but please be vigilant. The advice is always to keep an open dialogue with your children about their viewing, their posting and how to keep safe. As adults we are able to discern and set algorithms to positive content by steering clear of unwanted material. But children do not have the skills and understanding we have and if their interest in piqued by particular content, the platforms are set to offer similar images, text and accounts. This makes it very difficult for children to navigate away from unsuitable and damaging content. The NSPCC have written this guide to setting up Instagram safety features and general guidance for parents.

The <u>Online Safety Bill</u> which is going through parliament at the moment aims to make social media platforms accountable for the content they host. But still, at the moment, it is very much unregulated and needs a high degree of caution when it comes to protecting our children's childhoods and the way they see the world.

#### Anti-Bullying Day

This Monday we will be raising our community's awareness of anti-bullying through a morning assembly and lessons in class. Children are welcome to wear odd socks in support of the day.

#### Science Fair - Science in a Shoebox 2024

#### Friday 26th January

#### **Beckington Village Hall**

As old hands know, one of the major highlights of the Springmead Calendar is the annual Science Fair **for Years 3 – 6.** Again, this year it is taking place in January, so the three week break at Christmas would be a great time to get started!

All children in Years 3 – 6 have the opportunity to present a science project to younger children, peers, parents and staff. As well as providing an opportunity to get really involved in an extended science project it gives the children a super opportunity to 'present' to a wide range of people.

Children: you will need to choose **an aspect of Science**. How the information is presented is up to you! It could be through a practical activity or investigation, a poster explaining how to look after a particular animal, a short presentation on a laptop – the possibilities are endless!

You will need to do a **risk assessment** too, please do not include dangerous items and materials without prior discussion with teachers (on the day is too late).

# However, the challenge is to make sure that your display is no bigger than a shoebox!

You are expected to **work on your project at home**. You may work with a partner, but take into consideration that you will need to find time, out of school, to meet together to organise the work. **If you need any help in deciding on a topic, then please speak to your class teacher.** If this is your first time at preparing for the science fair, then maybe you could present your project on something that you have recently done in class.

#### How you present your project is as important as what you have produced.

As this is your chance to speak clearly and carefully on your chosen subject, please rehearse how you would deliver your answers to any questions on your project.

Children will need to bring their finished projects to the Village Hall to set up on Friday 26th January between 8:00am and 8:30am. During the morning, they will be able to share their projects with peers. Parents are invited to the Science Fair between 2:00pm and 3:00pm. Projects and children can be collected from the village hall between 3:00pm and 3:30pm.

NO school bags are needed on this day.

Children will come back to school for lunch and a change of pace!


After school clubs will run as usual for those wishing to attend.



For Nursery children, **if this is not your child's usual day**, please bring them into nursery, at 8.30am ready for their performance at 9am. Ideally, we would like children to perform in both performances so we will happily keep them for the second performance too. Please collect them at 12 noon.

Before each performance, for half an hour, we will be serving mince pies and coffee. We will be delighted to see you there. This is a great opportunity for a class pre-Christmas get together. Don't forget to book your tickets

from the office for your child's performance. We have allocated two tickets per child, but there may well be more available for other family and friends, please ask. You may take photos and film through both Nativity events, as there is no official filming, but please don't use flash or disturb our young performers. Photos and film must only be shared for private family use and not on social media.



Our beautiful candlelit carol service will be held at St George's Church, Beckington, led by our Prep department. Arrangements for the evening are as follows:

All children in Years 3 - 6 need to be seated in their place in church by 6:50pm. Children should be in full school uniform with fleeces, fleece side out for this occasion please. Please do not arrive before 6:45pm as the church will not be set up and we do not want the children to have to sit and wait quietly for too long!

Due to the lack of parking near the church on Church Hill and in Church Street, please park in the usual area on the Frome Road and walk to the church. You may need to allow extra time to do this!

Younger children are welcome to come along to the service and sit with their parents but please be aware that this will be a traditional service of carols and lessons that will suit our older children and adults. Out of

consideration for our young performers we would ask adults bringing toddlers and babies to stay at the back of the church in order to be able to take them outside promptly. You do not need tickets for this event but there will be a retiring collection for the heating and upkeep of St George's Church so please bring a donation.

#### South West Schools Biathlon Championships

On Sunday we had 4 of our children representing Springmead at Regional qualifiers held at Millfield School. It was an exciting albeit windy and chilly day, and all 4 children put in phenomenal performances throughout the day.

In **Year 3 we had Hebe, Charlotte and Lizzie** competing. The 25m swim was first and all 3 girls were in the same heat and were off to an amazing start with all 3 girls going faster than their previous best times. Then they went outside to take part in the 400m run. Charlotte was up first and stormed through winning her heat in an impressive time. Lizzie and Hebe followed in the next heat working really hard and securing themselves a great finish place. After that the points from both the run and the swim were added together and Charlotte was placed 3rd overall with 1760 points, Lizzie placed 9th overall with 1574 points and Hebe finished in 15th place with 1280 points. As a team of 3 their points were **added together and they won the team event!** 

**Iggy competed in the year 5 age group** and he did amazingly well in a very competitive category, he improved his time in the 50m swim and also showed immense determination in the 800m run working hard on the back straight of the second lap. He finished in 29th position overall once the points were added together.

All of the students showed great sportsmanship, and we are very proud of all of their results. There are several other qualifying events going on around Great Britain over the next few weeks, and once all of the results have been compiled a ranking list will be released inviting the top competitors to compete at the National finals held in bath in March of next year. We hope to see some of our students names on that list and will update you with who has made it to the finals.

# Class Highlights

#### **DUCKLINGS**

As we get to grips with the Blossom app, growing in proficiency and confidence, we are trying out new features that it offers. The new aspect to the software introduces developmental markers that we can record alongside the 'Golden Moments' observations that we share with you. Children's progress fits into age bands in the 7 areas of learning. These age bands are refined into Emerging, Developing and Secure levels so that we can see how children progress with us. The document they come from is called <u>Development Matters</u> and it is the result of the most recent research and knowledge of child development. It is a very interesting document and will give you clear markers of your child's development. Look out for comments with the observations we send home.

#### **SQUIRRELS**


