Dear Parents,



With over 80,000 schools in the South West region our talented artists shone. These pieces will now be put forward to the ISA Autumn Study Conference where the national finals will be held next week. In the meantime, as we wait for

results, enjoy the <u>virtual gallery</u> of the 7 ISA National regions and spot our deservedly winning art work.



The art department at Springmead has been gathering momentum over the last few years, with specialist teachers, inset training and our invitational clubs allowing some of our best pupil artists to have time together, inspiring each other, learning skills and honing techniques, all while under the watchful guidance of passionate teacher artists. Our enrichment week focus was art this year and introduced new ideas, a study of the history of art, and time spent with a working artist sharing their skills and life as a creator.

Our first art exhibition this summer, was a fabulous celebration of our whole community's passion for creative arts and this has been continued, through the building of our exciting art studio. We can't wait for the finish line to be in sight and to continue the amazing work that occurs each day in our school in this new specialist space.



CHRISTMAS GIFT SHOP

The children at Springmead have relished the experience of going to the Christmas Gift Shop and buying presents for members of their family over many years. Going shopping, planning gifts for others, rather than for yourself, is a very momentous event and ties in wonderfully with the Christmas message of giving. Our gift shop is a valuable event that relies entirely on the generous donations from parents and staff.

This year the Gift Shop will work as follows:

- The shop will be open on **Thursday 14**th **December** for children to select presents for their family. Nursery children can buy presents when they are in Nursery that week with our pop-up shop.
- The children and their teachers will gift wrap and label the items.
- All presents cost £2.50, children are allowed to spend a maximum of £12.50, on up to 5 presents.
- Children will be asked to bring in their shopping money in an envelope marked with their name and the names of the family members for whom they are buying gifts, the week before the shop opens. This will help us to ensure we have enough gifts of the right sort!
- Gifts can come into school in carrier bags from now onwards, there is a box in the library, or send them in with your child.
- Money raised from the Gift Shop will be used to buy additional equipment for the children, through the Springmead School Association.

The shop relies completely on donations from parents, gifts should be something your family members would like to receive, such as toiletries, stationery or toys.

Technique over speed.

While children are learning to swim, it is really important for them to focus on getting technique right rather than how fast they can swim. As if they are able to learn the skills and techniques correctly it establishes good habits, and the speed naturally comes. Whereas if you focus solely on going fast without the correct technique, it is significantly more difficult to correct the strokes once they have become a habit.

We do have some opportunities for those that are already secure in their technique to compete for the school. We also do the house gala at the end of the year for the children to all have a go at going fast, seeing how they have progressed and show off all their skills and technique.

Otters loved becoming busy little authors on Monday on our 'Creative Writing Day'. After listening to the wonderful story by John Burningham called 'The Magic Bed'. The children shared ideas of where they would like to travel to if they had a magic bed and what they would do when they were there. I absolutely love the way children jump straight into writing their stories, given free rein to see where their imaginations take them! Landing in the jungles looking for treasure amongst the animals, crashing into caves under the sea, flying off to Disneyland where rides malfunctioned and riding on dolphins were just some of the ideas that they wrote about. All that measuring, estimating and problem-solving. Prior to the assembling of ingredients, the class investigated the various engineering stages to build these magnificent roads which we can still see today, not forgetting that all roads lead to Rome.

They blew me away with their Hip Hop dance for showcase and their culinary skills when making the infamous Greek dish - Spanakopita.

The national curriculum states that;

'As part of their work with food, pupils should be taught how to cook and apply the principles of nutrition and healthy eating.'

As we made our way through the recipe, we discussed why leaving frying onions in a pan and wandering off to read a book isn't a good idea, how to crush garlic, the importance of seasoning, and of course, the importance of hygiene when cooking for ourselves and others. Once the filling was made using onions, garlic, spinach, feta and ricotta, it was time to tackle the filo pastry! With it being so thin and fragile, the Squirrels learned quickly that they had to move fast, folding their mixture into little triangular parcels!

Luckily, we got them into the oven in time, and they were able to take home their warm, Greek inspired, delights – alongside all the lessons learned along the way.






OWLS

EAGLES

The Eagles spent Wednesday afternoon with Mr & Mrs Hotson exploring fire. In the morning the class learnt about the science and history of fire, its importance through time, different ways to create, carry, store, and feed a fire successfully before a picnic lunch and a spot of entertainment provided by Wilbur the Labrador demonstrating diving and retrieval skills in the pond, much to the delight of the Eagles!

After lunch it was time to knuckle down to the important stuff once again with the practical element of the session working as a team to use the bow drill to create an ember from which a fire could start and then individual practise with the fire steel attempting to light the birch bark tinder.

After each session the children return to school and record their learning and their bushcraft journey in a journal that builds over the year and provides the theory element of their bushcraft assessment.
