



# **CHRISTMAS GIFT SHOP**

The children at Springmead have relished the experience of going to the Christmas Gift Shop and buying presents for members of their family over many years. Going shopping, planning gifts for others, rather than for yourself, is a very momentous event and ties in wonderfully with the Christmas message of giving. Our gift shop is a valuable event that relies entirely on the generous donations from parents and staff.

This year the Gift Shop will work as follows:

- The shop will be open on **Thursday 14**<sup>th</sup> **December** for children to select presents for their family. Nursery children can buy presents when they are in Nursery that week with our pop-up shop.
- The children and their teachers will gift wrap and label the items.
- All presents cost £2.50, children are allowed to spend a maximum of £12.50, on up to 5 presents.
- Children will be asked to bring in their shopping money in an envelope marked with their name and the names of the family members for whom they are buying gifts the week before -by **Thursday 7**th **December** This will help us to ensure we have enough gifts of the right sort!
- Gifts can come into school in carrier bags from now onwards, there is a box in the library, or send them in with your child.
- Money raised from the Gift Shop will be used to buy additional equipment for the children, through the **Springmead School Association**.

The shop relies completely on donations from parents, gifts should be something your family members would like to receive, such as toiletries, stationery or toys.





# Children in Need


Many thanks to parent, Nicola Newman for linking us in with The Big Learner Relay and letting us make her car even more spotty! We have raised £273 from our families generous donations.

You may take photos and film through both Nativity events, as there is no official filming, but please don't use flash or disturb our young performers. Photos and film must only be shared for private family use and not on social media.



Our beautiful candlelit carol service will be held at St George's Church, Beckington, led by our Prep department. Arrangements for the evening are as follows:

All children in Years 3 - 6 need to be seated in their place in church by 6:50pm. Children should be in full school uniform with fleeces, fleece side out for this occasion please. Please do not arrive before 6:45pm as the church will not be set up and we do not want the children to have to sit and wait quietly for too long!

Due to the lack of parking near the church on Church Hill and in Church Street, please park in the usual area on the Frome Road and walk to the church. You may need to allow extra time to do this!

Younger children are welcome to come along to the service and sit with their parents but please be aware that this will be a traditional service of carols and lessons that will suit our older children and adults. Out of consideration for our young performers we would ask adults bringing toddlers and babies to stay at the back of the church in order to be able to take them outside promptly. You do not need tickets for this event but there will be a retiring collection for the heating and upkeep of St George's Church so please bring a donation.

### **New Menu**

Our new menu is on our <u>website</u>. We choose to serve a 'deconstructed menu' so that children can make their own choices from the widest possible range of nutritious food we offer to create a healthy plate. It allows children to understand food groups and nutrition, view ingredients and have autonomy over their lunch. All children are supported by staff in the choices they make. No lunch is the same in the dining hall. The changes put in place at this time were direct from School Council suggestions.

### PE Lesson

On Wednesday afternoon the Year 5 children enjoyed a **bench ball tournament** in their PE lesson.

Bench ball is a game played to develop teamwork, hand-eye coordination, and strategic thinking skills. The children were split into 3 teams given them a chance to play against a couple of different teams.

RULES: Team 1 should be in one half of the court, Team 2 in the other. Both teams choose a goalie. The goalie stands on the bench on the opposition's half of the court. Players attempt to throw the ball to their goalie to catch, without it being caught or intercepted by the other team. As teams score goals, the scoring player joins the goalie on the bench. Players pass the ball between themselves until someone decides to shoot, but must stay on their half of the court. The aim of the game is to get all the players of your team on your bench, so that they have more people to throw the ball to.

# Class Highlights

### DUCKLINGS

In planning for our Nativity film this year we wanted a 'real' element to it, and this week, we invited Kelly's Donkeys to bring us Dermot the donkey to help us in filming some scenes. All children have had playful teaching points around the Nativity story that guide and model the narrative. Play is built into our provision, to provide concrete experiences for children to explore their own and other characters in the story, the setting and the context, to enable them to act a role. By exploring emotions behind the characters, children develop ideas and a knowledge of the story and relate these feelings back to themselves. Symbolic representation through our small world toys such as our Nativity set along with making our own characters are important in developing children's thinking and understanding.

We produce a Nativity film as this illustrates what the children are capable of best of all. To create scenes, we direct the adults involved to step back, to not be instructive, allowing the children to develop their own dramatic interpretations and see what happens. We prepare the children for the scene beforehand. As the children step into the very informal 'set', in costume, they begin to act, mimicking each other or independently expressing themselves through their prior knowledge and innate desire to recreate roles and pretend.

The film, accompanied by songs and a tableau will be premiered to parents on Tuesday 5th December at both 9am and 11am. Virtual tickets costing £5 are available from Kim, in the office, by email on office@springmead.com.



## **HEDGEHOGS**

This week we have enjoyed learning about Diwali, the Hindu festival of light. For homework, last week, the children made a Diwali lantern decoration to being into school to decorate the classroom. They were all so colourful and bright and look great hung up over the fireplace. Well done, everyone.

We used stories and videos to learn all about Diwali and discovered some wonderful ways Hindu's celebrate including making Indian sweets, which we thought sounded delicious! We loved using clay to make diva lamps which they use to decorate their houses and temples. We had to listen carefully and follow instructions to how to make the lamp. It took lots of strength to squish, roll and smooth the clay. We then used tools to create patterns in our lamps. We had to be very careful not to poke holes all the way through. It was great for our fine motor skills. We can wait until the clay is dry enough so that we are able to paint and decorate our lamps. Happy Diwali!

They've made some super little books, full of facts about each continent and they have been discussing where they would like to travel to and where they have already been.


The children have begun rehearsing for the Christmas nativity along with Year 1. This year it has been written by Mrs Stickley who has cleverly interwoven the history of man along with the story of Christmas. There are some wonderful characters in the nativity, including Pythagoras and King Khufu!

At any given opportunity, the children in the class ask to read, which is brilliant! They enjoy telling each other about the books they're reading and give recommendations about what to read next. I have never known a class quite like them!



### **BADGERS**

It was an amazing day at the Roman Baths with the Badgers having a hands-on experience investigating artefacts, twisting togas into place and some terrific taking of the waters (hot and steamy). There was Latin to learn, archaeological digging, a little light engineering, puzzles to sort and stone spotting. It was so lovely to hear a member of the public saying how beautifully behaved the children were. We had an amazing teacher who directed the fantastic activities, and no question was too much. By the end of the day everyone had experienced something new, collaborated with classmates, and tried their hands at a practical activity. Everyone entered the world of Roman life from long ago and found links to today. History is a great subject for making sense of things today.



# **SQUIRRELS**

This week in Maths, the Squirrels have been looking at area. The children learnt that area is the space taken up by a two-dimensional shape or surface and measured it practically. For their problem-solving skills, knowledge of the properties of squares and rectangles were revised to support in finding the areas of shapes with parts missing. They then explored the idea that a rectilinear shape is a shape that has only straight sides and right angles and that they need to touch at the sides and not just at the corners. They then worked systematically to find all the different rectilinear shapes using a given number of squares by moving one square at a time, before moving on to drawing their own shapes with a given area.

### **OWLS**

This week in Owls we finished off our multiplication and division unit in Maths. The children enjoyed learning about cube and square numbers and developing their problem solving skills. We spent a lot of time during this unit thinking about how to tackle multi- step word problems by underlining the key information and thinking about what operation was required to solve it. We also discussed the importance of reading the question very carefully to ensure that no important steps were missed. It was wonderful to see the children applying their growth mindsets with some of these challenging problems as this allowed them to progress and take on the end of unit assessment with confidence and determination.

The children also completed their Native American dreamcatchers in Art this week. They worked hard on these and were very patient with the sometimes fiddly job of carefully weaving the thread to create a pattern.

Well done for bringing all of the energy and positivity again this week Owls, keep being wonderful!



### **FOXES**

The Foxes had another practical science lesson on Monday, investigating the correlation between the weight and mass of an object by using scales and Newton meters. They learnt about the work of Isaac Newton and how theories about gravity have changed over the centuries, and were particularly fascinated to learn that Newton made many of his discoveries when he was forced into a 'lockdown' during an outbreak of the plague.

English lessons have led to writing a newspaper article looking at two sides of an argument, inspired by the recent instalments of Ban this Book, the class novel by Alan Gratz. They have created some fantastic headlines and are able to justify their comments with plenty of evidence.

The Eagles were back with Mr and Mrs Hotson this week, enjoying the last bushcraft session at the cabin this term. With our first day in the woods approaching in early December, the children enjoyed another opportunity to learn about the key skills on bushcraft. Their base of knowledge is building nicely for this group of Eagles and having learnt about knife-craft and fire-craft in recent weeks we completed the important trinity with shelter-craft. Finding out how to work smarter and not harder when shelter building, where to and not to build, how to make ourselves safer, adding comfort (beds and mattresses) and exploring several different styles of shelter was the information packed into our session. We will see how the group are able to make use of this knowledge when in the woods in a few weeks.
