### **CHRISTMAS GIFT SHOP**

The children at Springmead have relished the experience of going to the Christmas Gift Shop and buying presents for members of their family over many years. Going shopping, planning gifts for others, rather than for yourself, is a very momentous event and ties in wonderfully with the Christmas message of giving. Our gift shop is a valuable event that relies entirely on the generous donations from parents and staff. Thank you so much to families who have donated already.

This year the Gift Shop will work as follows:

- The shop will be open on **Thursday 14**<sup>th</sup> **December** for children to select presents for their family. Nursery children can buy presents when they are in Nursery that week with our pop-up shop.
- The children and their teachers will gift wrap and label the items.
- All presents cost £2.50, children are allowed to spend a maximum of £12.50, on up to 5 presents.
- Children will be asked to bring in their shopping money in an envelope marked with their name and the names of the family members for whom they are buying gifts the week before -by **Thursday 7**th **December** This will help us to ensure we have enough gifts of the right sort!
- Gifts can come into school in carrier bags from now onwards, there is a box in the library, or send them in with your child.
- Money raised from the Gift Shop will be used to buy additional equipment for the children, through the **Springmead School Association**.

The shop relies completely on donations from parents, gifts should be something your family members would like to receive, such as toiletries, stationery or toys.


Further information went out in last week's newsletter and to classes.


#### Year 5 and 6 Boulder Rooms

The children chose whether to work independently or collaboratively, taking ownership over their learning.



#### **FOXES**

The Foxes have concluded work on comparing and contrasting themes and characters across two novels by creating their own stories using some of the themes. Thy spent lots of time sharing ideas, forming plans and developing how their paragraphs would evolve before writing the actual stories. And wow, they have made a fantastic job of it. I'm so proud of how their writing has developed over the term.

We concluded our learning looking at modern history in USA with a debate on the policies of the Republican and Democratic parties, with Owls and Foxes each taking one party, preparing an argument and then posing questions to the other side. We had a free vote at the end of the debate, proof that the children could argue a case despite not necessarily being if favour of what they were supporting.



#### **EAGLES**

The Eagles completed their first terms bushcraft learning with a session in the woods at Gare Hill. On a cold and damp morning, the sight of the fire in the centre of camp was very welcome, as was the smell of hot chocolate being busily prepared by Mrs Hotson.

Mr Hotson gave the class a tour of the camp and reinforced the safety rules before we began the activities for the day. The session built on the knowledge and understanding from the bushcraft curriculum that the children have studied this term. We began by using knife skills to create a candle holder using hazel boughs and birch bark. Next, we moved into another part of the forest and collected different grades of wood – matchstick thickness to wrist thickness. The children are becoming great collectors of fuel and adhere to the bushcraft rule of 'Hug Size Bundle'. After the collaborative collection we moved to working together to build and start a fire using our skills with the fire steel.

After a delicious lunch of burgers and hotdogs the Eagles completed their session by continuing their skill and knowledge development in relation to shelter building – focussing on the positioning of branches and thatching skills. The class had a great first day in the woods and can't wait to return to our bushcraft
