Holiday Club Update - Please book ahead, to take advantage of pricing!

With our move to a 50 week nursery we were able to reintroduce food into our Holiday Club provision over Christmas. This was very well received with the children enjoying the food and the parents enjoying the convenience.

From February half term, we will include food in our provision for all children. There is a cost implication to this, and **the rates will now be as follows**;

- 8.00am to 8.30am Free
- 8.30am to 3.30pm day £32.00 per day
- 3.30pm to 6.00pm after club care £4.00 per ½ hour

We also recognise that our holiday club is becoming more popular, although the numbers vary significantly over the course of the week. We need to be able to staff our provision effectively to give the children the best opportunities. To do this we need to encourage early booking, hence, from now on we are introducing a tiered fee.

For February half-term, bookings must be made within the next two weeks to take advantage of the costs above. Going forward, these rates will be secured if booked up to one month before the holiday starts.

If booking within 1 month of the holiday start date rates charged will be;

- 8.00am to 8.30am Free
- 8.30am to 3.30pm day £38.00 per day
- 3.30pm to 6.00pm after club care £5.00 per ½ hour

And if booking during the holiday period;

- 8.00am to 8.30am Free
- 8.30am to 3.30pm day £45.00 per day, including food
- 3.30pm to 6.00pm after club care £7.00 per ½ hour

Children who are not registered at the school will be charged £5.00 extra per day on top of the rates above.

Swimming News

Swimming hats

When swimming, a useful piece of kit is a swimming hat, as it keeps your hair out of your eyes/face. This is particularly beneficial for those with longer hair as having your hair move across your face whenever you are trying to breathe can be very off-putting.

It can also impact the overall technique, as a swimmer is more likely to lift their head to breathe rather than roll to the side to avoid this happening. This impedes the swimmer's progression as it completely changes the body position in the water once the head is lifted.

School swimming hats are available to purchase, and the swimming teachers are on hand to help anyone who needs assistance to get their swimming hat on correctly.

OWLS

This week in Owls we continued to practise the long multiplication method and then moved onto short division. The children worked extremely hard to methodically work through the steps involved, applying their knowledge of place value to understand what each digit represented. They then deepened their understanding by challenging themselves with tricky problem- solving questions, which put what they had learned into context. Well done for being resilient learners Owls!


We also worked hard to design a fair test in Science this week, exploring what would be the most effective lining for a lunchbox. The children theorised that their lunchbox lining would need to be a good thermal insulator in order to keep the food inside nice and cool. They then tested this by wrapping a container filled with ice in different materials and taking temperature readings at 5 minute intervals. It was great to see the children thinking carefully about how they could ensure their results were reliable by only changing one thing (the material) each time they did the experiment and keeping everything else exactly the same. Great job scientists!



Foxes

The Foxes rattled through their long multiplication work and have moved on to a look at division this week. They have very quickly grasped new concepts and are starting to enjoy the problem-solving challenges they are being presented with.

Our English lessons inspired by the class novel, Treason, have led to some lively discussions, and a great drama session recreating a scene in the Great Hall of Westminster Palace. We have looked at the portraits of Hans Holbein and other Tudor artists and have spent time sketching notable Tudor characters. Even our mindfulness activities are inspired by the Tudors; we are fully immersed in this term's theme!



EAGLES

Despite the bitterly cold weather the Eagles were glad to be back out with Mr & Mrs Hotson for our first bushcraft session of the new term. Although the snow we had hoped for hadn't happened, there was plenty of ice around including a fully frozen pond!

The log burner in the cabin was producing a lovely warmth on our arrival and we all settled down for the theory section of the session. After a brief recap of previous learning Mr Hotson introduced our topic for the day – Water. The class learnt about the importance of water, the rule of 3's, issues that arise from lack of water and how to find and procure water in our outdoor environment.

After lunch we ventured out into the cold and explored the practical element of our learning including how to set up a stand to boil water, collecting water from a body of water (frozen or not), using a Millbank bag to filter water and setting up a tarp shelter to collect water.

Another great session learning outside of the classroom or inside the classroom with no walls. We are greatly looking forward to the next session but hoping for a little warmer weather or snow!
