This year marks the 10th anniversary of Children's Mental Health Week and this year's theme is 'My Voice Matters'. 1 in 6 children and young people have a diagnoseable mental health condition and it is so important that children know that they are heard and are not alone.

At Springmead we know that the conversations we have every day are so important in understanding and accepting the ups and downs of our mental health. Having a weeklong focus on the importance of talking and listening across the whole school is great too as it brings everyone on to the same page at the same time, hopefully empowering all the children to feel heard. There will be activities such as 'Whisper games' where children really have to listen to each other to be heard, whole school assemblies on how to look after our mental health, discussions on children recognising when they know that they matter, and how our feelings can change from one moment to the next and all are acceptable.

The Senior Leadership Team will be on hand in the library overseeing all appointments and offering refreshments and opportunities to view children's work prior to meetings.



SWIMMING NEWS

A simple guide to competitive swimming:

For those wishing to go into competitive swimming, when you first start out it can be a little bit confusing learning all the rules for competing, so please read on for some information that can be helpful.

When you first join a swimming club you must become a Swim England member, either as a Swim England club train, or Swim England Club Compete. Whether you become Club Train or Club Compete comes down to age and if you want to compete. If you do not want to compete and just want to do training for fitness you can opt to remain Club Train. If you want to compete, then once you are turning 9 that year you can become a Club Compete member allowing you to be able to enter Level 3 licensed competitions.

What are Licensed competitions? These are events that are run by swimming clubs where the times recorded go onto the rankings database. There are 4 different levels beginning at level 4 (low level), usually club championship events. The times from these events go onto the rankings database and can be used to qualify for up to County Championship level events. These meets will also generally allow younger swimmers to compete, who would not normally be allowed to compete at a level 3 competition. However, do check the specific conditions regarding age to be certain.

Level 3 competitions (development level) have upper qualifying times, which means you cannot enter an event if you are faster than that time. But you can enter into events even if you have never done them before as a NT (no time). These competitions can be swum Long Course in either a 50m pool or Short Course in a 25m pool. To enter these events a swimmer must be 9 years old by the end of the competition. Times from these competitions can be used to enter events up to Regional level.

Level 2 competitions (mid-high Level) These events have lower qualifying times, meaning you cannot enter the event unless you have already swum it at a previous event faster than the qualifying time. These events are always swum Short Course in a 25m pool, and can be used for up to Regional level events.

Level 1 competitions (high level) have lower qualifying times, meaning you cannot enter the event unless you have already swum it at a previous event faster than the qualifying time. These events are always swum Long Course in a 50m pool. The times gained from these events can be used for National level events, as long as they are inside the qualifying window period.

Most licensed competitions adopt an age on day approach where swimmer will compete in the age group based on how old they are at the end of the meet. However for the higher level competitions County, Regional, National and British Championships they use a year of birth approach. This means that you race against all the people who were born the same year as you. So if you are born in January you have an advantage over those born in December as you are the oldest in the age group for these events.

For our swimmers at Springmead, those that compete can aim towards County championships (either Somerset or Wiltshire depending on which club you swim at/ where you live) as that starts at 10/11 years (year of birth). Some may even start to look towards trying to make the South West Regional Championships as that starts at 11/12 years (year of birth).

We also did our 'SASA' NASA training in which they practised balance, agility, teamwork, puzzle solving and much more. Well done Rabbits!




OTTERS

It has been such a pleasure to read their passionate diary entries and it is evident that the children really thought carefully about the perspectives that they were writing from. 




Foxes

The Foxes excelled themselves at last week's Science Fair with their knowledge, creativity and confidence to share their findings. They have demonstrated their scientific enquiry skills again this week, by investigating materials to find the best insulator for keeping food cool and fresh, showing that they can share ideas, record results accurately and interpret their findings to form a conclusion.

They are enjoying our art work, experimenting with water colour pencils and water colour paints, and are looking forward to collaging next week, using a variety of materials to create a mixed media piece of work embracing this half term's knowledge and skills.







EAGLES

The Eagles were back with Mr and Mrs Hotson on Wednesday afternoon, enjoying the opportunity to learn about a very important tool in the bushcrafter's armoury, to practise their fire lighting skills by combining the previous knowledge and learning and one of the highlights of the bushcraft calendar – the annual archery competition.

The age of our Eagles prevents them from any hands-on practical activities using an axe, but the importance of the tool means that learning about it is a fundamental part of our bushcraft curriculum. The class learnt about the anatomy of an axe, different size axes, how axes can be used and witnessed several different techniques for using an axe – some demonstrated brilliantly by Mr Hotson and some demonstrated by Mr Munckton to a slightly lesser standard!

In previous sessions the class have learnt and practised their fire lighting techniques without a requirement to prepare the area or provide their own fuel. This time the class were given a small amount of tinder and a fire steel, and were asked to find a safe area to light a fire and to find enough fuel to keep the fire burning for 5 – 10 minutes. Initially, most of the class went about the process individually before realising that the task required a great deal of fuel and that co-operation would be massively beneficial to achieving the goal. It was great to see the children putting their learning into positive action and organising themselves collaborative to help each other.

The archery competition was, once again, extremely competitive. The class were extremely impressive with their archery skills, with multiple hits on the target, including a bullseye from Alfred. The final was between Elliott and Bea who had achieved the most successful hits. In the sudden-death style head-to-head it was Bea who overcame Elliott with her second arrow bouncing into the target!
