# Class Highlights

### **DUCKLINGS**

The Nursery children are embracing the new theme for the Nursery which is based on the music "Carnival of the Animals" by Camille Saint Saen. Each day, we have listened to a piece of his music and have followed this up with activities. We are talking with the children about how the music makes us feel, why the music sounds as it does and how the animals are represented through the music. We've talked about the different animals and researched them, discussed animal environments and how they live. The children have been composers this week using keyboards to explore sounds. It has been interesting to watch them develop their confidence with the keyboard and drums; some children were reluctant to have a go initially, but through modelling how to play began to explore the notes and sounds and by the end of the session were trying out scales, noticing the changes from each note.



### **HEDGEHOGS**

This week the Hedgehogs have started their new theme of 'Growing'. We are willing the sunshine and spring to arrive!

The new role play farm shop has been a hit with the Hedgehogs. They have been busy buying their fresh veg, taking orders in the café and working on the till! We have also enjoyed story telling with our small world farm and enjoyed the story of What the Ladybird Heard where we made some wanted posters to help catch those naughty robbers. If you see them out and about do let the Hedgehogs know! Sharing books with children is a great way for children to develop listening and attention skills and is also a great way to develop and use language. Developing story telling skills help children to communicate and connect with others, to explore relationships and develop understanding of scenarios and situations in real life. We have certainly enjoyed developing our skills this week.



### **RABBITS**

What a fantastic week back. It's been wonderful hearing about everyone's half terms and especially any cool space observations!

We've been continuing to concentrate on spelling tricky words using some super mnemonics, some of which we have come up with ourselves, the stranger the better!

We have started to make rockets for our rocket launch experiment - we will soon be making some predictions about what will make the rocket go the furthest, needless to say we have some excited scientists!

The Rabbits also started some beautiful still life paintings of daffodils. They are all really taking their time over every detail and have produced some lovely art.

Well done Rabbits - looking forward to a busy, exciting term!




### **OTTERS**

This week the Otters have been finding out about the incredible engineer, Isambard Kingdom Brunel. They learnt about his upbringing and how his French engineer father, Marc Brunel, was determined to make Isambard the best engineer in the world - and he certainly succeeded! They looked at the variety of projects that Brunel worked on such as the Box Tunnel, the Clifton Suspension bridge, the Great Western Railway and dockyard. They enjoyed learning about the SS Great Britain and painted some great pictures of the ship.

In PSHE the theme is currently all about money. Questions like what money is used for and how it is spent, such as bank cards, cash, bank transfers etc where all discussed. They class kept me on my toes when talking about inflation of toys, mortgages and insurance – I thought I was in an A Level business class at one stage!

In maths the children are continuing to work on multiplication and division and in SPaG, the focus has been on verbs.



### BADGERS

The Badgers were back at the sett after the half term break, ready for action. The Writing Stories topic is still in full flow and the team have clearly been busy reading over the holiday, keen to spot any page turning hints, interesting plot lines and for any top tips to add to their writing repertoire. One of the many, important parts to writing is the punctuation. Using those flying commas, otherwise known as apostrophes, is a tricky thing. They could be there to say who or what things belong to, or as a clue to missing letters. Don't worry! The Badgers are on it and have been busy working out which is which and what they tell us.

As well as writing stories, the class love to read them too, whether they be adventure, myths, legends or historical. This is handy for learning lines, with the Easter Production on the horizon. The other lines the Badgers have been investigating are those involved with length and perimeter. It is a skill to be able to measure accurately and to understand how to do this. The class top tip is to take one step at a time with any problem-solving and don't worry if you get something wrong! Keep up the good work, Badgers.



## Squirrels

This week the Squirrels have delved into the world of polygons, length and perimeter.

Through practical exercises, they unravelled the intricacies of measuring sides and calculating perimeters, applying their newfound knowledge to polygons of varying shapes and sizes. As they engage in hands-on activities and collaborative tasks, they not only develop a deeper understanding of concepts like perimeter and measurement but also hone their problem-solving skills and critical thinking abilities.



### **OWLS**

This week the children had their final dance session! Dance classes offer a myriad of benefits for children that extend beyond just physical activity. Through dance, children enhance their coordination, balance, and motor skills while also boosting their self-confidence and self-esteem through mastering movements and performing in front of others. Dance also serves as a creative outlet for children to express themselves, fostering their imagination and emotional development. ### **EAGLES**

Having checked the weather forecast on Tuesday afternoon the Eagles were prepared for a wet bushcraft session on Wednesday. As semi-seasoned bushcrafters they came suitably dressed to combat the elements and enjoy another learning experience with Mr & Mrs Hotson.

Luckily our session was based in the cabin with heat being produced by the log-burner, making a very 'toasty' and enjoyable environment to learn away from the teeming rain. As you do not always have a cabin with log-burner available, one crucial aspect of bushcraft is the significance of clothing. In a world where modern conveniences often shield us from the elements, understanding how to dress appropriately for outdoor adventures becomes increasingly important.

On Wednesday the Eagles learnt about:

- 1. **The Role of Clothing in Bushcraft:** how clothing serves as our first line of defence against the elements, protecting us from harsh weather conditions, insects, and other environmental factors.
- 2. **Choosing the Right Gear:** From moisture-wicking base layers to durable outer shells, the importance of selecting the right clothing and gear for various outdoor activities.
- 3. **Traditional vs. Modern Approaches:** We explored traditional clothing worn by indigenous peoples and how modern advancements have influenced outdoor apparel, considering the benefits of both approaches.
- 4. **Practical Application:** We learnt how to properly layer clothing for warmth, stay dry in wet conditions, and adapt attire to different climates and terrains. Learning about bushcraft and outdoor clothing not only equips our students with

valuable life skills but also fosters a sense of confidence, resilience, and appreciation for the natural world.



### **OUT OF SCHOOL ACHIEVEMENTS**

Our Year 5 pupil competed at the West of England Taekwondo Championships last week and won the bronze medal trophy for sparring in the girls red belt division. In the same week, their sister, our Year 1 pupil, performed in her first adult belt grading in front of almost 400 people and the second highest ranked Grandmaster in the UK. Having completed all of her junior grades she is now a senior yellow belt. Congratulations!
