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PERFORMING ARTS

Music Buzz Word: CRESCENDO AND DECRESCENDO - Getting gradually louder or gradually softer respectively.

Results of the Music Questionnaire:

Over the last week or so, I have had the opportunity to deliver a questionnaire to the pupils in Year 3 and 4 at our school, and to chat with them about the Music provision on offer, gauging their preferences for learning styles and topics, while also developing my understanding of where the pupils' priorities and enjoyment lie, which will allow me to develop and shape our curriculum to reflect their growing interests and to extend learning for all.

The **children were asked 5 questions** about class and school music:

- What is your favourite music topic?
- Is there any element of classroom music you would like to develop and do more?
- What is your favourite aspect of music at school?
- Do you enjoy whole-school singing, especially the singing assemblies?
- Do you have any general comments you would like to make?

Over **60%** of pupils said that their favourite element of music is performance, with Christmas and Productions mentioned as particular highlights, while the remaining **40%** of children all voted for composition and music-writing as their favourite topic.

When asked what they would like to increase within their music lessons, nearly **60%** asked for more opportunities to play instruments as a class. This result has already fed into next term's planning when these particular classes will do a storytelling composition project, using any instruments they feel appropriately fit the narrative. The remaining **40%** suggested more timetabled classroom music time in general, and more opportunities for solo singing, among other things.

Some of the general comments made by the children included:

'We would like longer music lessons'

'Can we go door-to-door carolling at Christmas?'

'We would like to make our own instruments'

'Can we have an interactive whiteboard so we can use it to play music games and watch music videos?'



Class Highlights

DUCKLINGS AND HEDGEHOGS

On Wednesday the Reception and Nursery classes had a day of discovery at Hidden Woods. They loved the rope swing, the mud kitchen, the campfire, the den building, the nets to watch the tree canopies, the logs to balance on and of course the marshmallows.

On arrival, we were met by Barny and Louis, who enveloped the children in the magical experience they offer. Every child matters at Hidden Woods, their staff listen, involve and lead the children in noticing the detail, sharing the love they feel for the natural world. They engaged the children through songs and stories and offered an experience that reflected their deep understanding of children, their behaviours and their needs.

After a safety briefing, a tour and a pinecone hide and seek team game, the children and adults set off to explore the vast site. The children demonstrated a range of approaches to this adventure. Some hurtled headlong into a physical, adrenaline whooped activity offered by the climbing challenges, others became absorbed into crafts or the mud kitchen, some children initially tried every activity for a few minutes before excitedly moving on, others queued genteelly for the rope swing and some children watched and observed it all from the safety of a familiar adult who toured the site with them until they were confident to choose an activity to try themselves.

The very best part of Hidden Woods is that children are able to roam safely across the site independently. It is well managed and accessible to our children, so adults stationed themselves at specific points to support, challenge, offer advice and play. Steve and his team brought well planned activities at perfect moments. Lunch around the campfire was a gathering with songs, clapping and listening to each other to create a community feel.

After lunch the children's energy changed, now familiar with the woods, combining to play favourite games, they examined and experimented with their environment in more detail and depth. The day ended with a gathering to share with each other all the children's favourite moments.

RABBITS
